I. Two difficulties in the study of theology

- A. Knowledge vs. indoctrination: the post-Enlightenment context
  - 1. The structure of indoctrination: ideology

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- 2. The structure of knowledge: inquiring intelligence and reflecting reasonableness
- 3. Theology as knowledge: the pursuit of accurate understanding concerning the dimension of ultimacy in human experience

    - a. the radical secularity of all experience

- II. Religion and Culture: an introduction
  - A. Dimensions of the problem
    - 1. Historical context of present situation: where have we come from?
    - 2. The option of the future: where are we heading? What is going forward?
      - a. Post-historic humanity: an evolutionary blind alley
      - b. World cultural humanity: a qualitative leap to a series of new schemes of recurrence
  - B. Culture
    - 1. Defined: the at least implicitly operative set of assumptions of meaning and value that inform the lifestyle and project of the members of a given group of people
    - 2. Two uses of the definition: restricted and general
    - 3. The priority of the more general use
  - C. Cultural epochs
    - 1. The notion of the control of meaning: i.e., techniques of procuring intelligibility
    - 2. Mythic consciousness, realistic consciousness, self-appropriating consciousness
    - 3. A new epoch: Lonergan, Mumford, Jung, scholars of religions
    - 4. The common denominator: a new differentiation of human consciousness through interiority

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
